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This Report covers the activities of the Institute during the year April 1964—March 1965. It also contains the audited statement of accounts and the annual balance sheet for the same period.

1. ORGANISATIONAL MATTERS

Shri Lal Bahadur Shastri was unanimously elected President of the Institute for the year 1964-65 at the Tenth Annual Meeting of the General Body held on the 23rd October, 1964.

In accordance with Rule 14(5) of the Rules of the Institute, biennial elections were held in July, 1964, to fill eight vacancies in the membership of the Executive Council, and the following were elected:

The reconstituted Executive Council, at its fifty-ninth meeting held on the 23rd October, 1964, re-elected Dr. C.D. Deshmukh as its Chairman, and re-coopted Shri H.C. Mathur, Shri Dharam Vira and Shri L.P. Singh as its members for a further period of one year. It also co-opted Shri S. Bhoothalingam and Shri Tarlok Singh as members in the remaining two vacancies.

The Executive Council re-elected Pandit H.N. Kunzru, Shri Gurmukh Nihal Singh, Dr. G.S. Mahajani and Shri C. Subramaniam as Vice-Presidents for another term of two years, and also elected Mr. Justice P.B. Gajendragadkar in the fifth vacancy which occurred as a result of the election of Shri Lal Bahadur Shastri as President of the Institute. Shri Gulzarilal Nanda continues to hold office until the Annual-General Meeting in 1965. Shri S. Ranganathan was re-elected as Honorary Treasurer for a further term of two years.

The Executive Council held six meetings during the year.

The Standing Committee held four meetings during the year.

In January, 1965, Dr. C.D. Deshmukh tendered his resignation from the chairmanship of the Executive

Council on grounds of health. The Council accepted the resignation with great regret, and unanimously elected Shri Asoka Mehta as its Chairman.

MEMBERSHIP

During the year under review, two hundred and thirty eight members were admitted (Ordinary 186; Corporate 8; Associate 38; Life 6); seven Ordinary Members compounded their subscription for Life Membership; and twenty-eight Ordinary Members resigned. Three members whose names had been removed earlier for non-payment of subscription were re-admitted on payment of arrears.

Names of 316 Ordinary, and 2 Corporate Members were removed for non-payment of dues for nearly 5 years, after all efforts to persuade them to pay the arrears proved ineffective. A comparative table of total net membership as on 31st March, 1964, and 1965, is given below:

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The number of ordinary members, who were in arrears as on the 1st April, 1965, was 925. Of these, 560 had not paid their subscriptions for two years and over.

2. ACTIVITIES OF THE INSTITUTE

I. RESEARCH

At the request of the Punjab Government, the Institute has undertaken research studies on operational problems in

the State Administration, under the aegis of the Punjab Administrative Reforms Commission. The fields being covered include: organisation and staffing of the Punjab Civil Secretariat for policy making; programme planning and implementation; the changed role of the Deputy Commissioner; co-ordination of development programmes; attitudes of the citizens towards administration; and improvement of procedures generally. The Government of Punjab has sanctioned a grant of Rs. 54,000 to the Institute for this purpose.

The work on the monograph on the evolution and organisation of the Indian Audit and Accounts Department, which is being prepared by Shri M.S. Ramayyar, formerly Additional Deputy Comptroller and Auditor General, Government of India, and former Deputy Director of the Institute, is now in its concluding stage.

The second and revised edition of the "Organisation of the Government of India" is now under print.

Preliminary steps are being taken to undertake the detailed study of the organisation and functions of one of the Ministries of the Government of India, and its subordinate offices, as suggested by Shri Lal Bahadur Shastri in his presidential address at the last annual general body meeting of the Institute.

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Research Projects financed by the Ford Foundation

It may be recalled that the Ford Foundation had in January, 1962 sanctioned a grant of \$700,000 to support the first two years of the Institute's five-year programme of training and research. It was supplementary to the grant of \$350,000 made to the Institute by the Foundation in 1954, to provide general support for a period of three years. With the support of the supplementary grant of \$ 700,000, the Institute had, with the concurrence of the Ford Foundation, undertaken several projects and programmes (they have already been mentioned in the previous Annual Reports). Though the supplementary grant was for a period of two years, some of the approved research projects and programmes were for more than two years, and it was expected that the term of the sanction would be extended, as it was done in

respect of the original grant, or the grant would be renewed for the balance of the amount not drawn. Out of \$700,000 sanctioned, a sum of \$200,000 was released in 1963, and a second instalment (as mentioned later) of \$97,500 was released in September, 1964.

Early in 1964, the Ford Foundation informed the Institute that the grant period had expired at the end of 1963, and there was uncertainty of releasing further instalments of the grant, or to renew the grant itself. The Director had several discussions with the Representative of the Ford Foundation, and he was able to persuade him to release the second instalment of \$97,500, mainly for meeting the expenditure on the Reflective Training Programme. In the course of subsequent negotiations, the Director got the understanding that though, at the moment, there was no possibility of getting a further grant for fresh schemes and expansion of the Institute activities, the Institute could expect the Ford Foundation to release the balance left (approximately \$400,000) from the previous grant. Accordingly, a formal request was made to the Ford Foundation for the release of the balance amount, or to sanction a fresh grant for an amount representing the balance not drawn out of the previous grant, to enable the Institute to complete and implement the research projects and programmes which had been approved by the Ford Foundation, and already started.

But at the beginning of 1965, the Ford Foundation informed the Institute that no further funds from the grant were available to continue projects started under the grant. The Foundation also advised that as the grant had expired, it was necessary to bring the various projects supported by the grant, in so far as they were dependent upon the funds from that grant, to as useful a conclusion as possible. The Foundation has, however, assured the Institute that the termination of the supplementary grant is in no way indicative of a lack of interest in the Institute, and that it was prepared to consider financial support for further programmes

for strengthening the training and research activities of the Institute. Negotiations for a fresh grant on the broad lines indicated by the Ford Foundation have been initiated. But in the meantime, the Institute has no alternative but to bring the various projects, supported by the previous grant, to as useful a conclusion as possible from the balance available out of the funds already released to the Institute.

The progress made on some of the important research projects and programmes undertaken with the assistance of the Ford Foundation supplementary grant, is mentioned below:

(i) *Study Project on India's Experience in Development Planning*

This 3-year project was taken up in November, 1963. The study envisages depth analysis of the planning organisation and process in India. The first phase of the project consists of the study of the organisation and functioning of the Planning Commission. As a part of this phase, a monograph entitled "Planning Commission: A Descriptive Account" was completed and published during the year. A study of the organisation and functioning of the Planning Commission in its actual working, especially in respect of the formulation of the Fourth Plan, was continued during the period under report.

(ii) *Project on the Administrative History of India (1834-1947)*

The projected work on the Administrative History of India, as reported earlier, is to be completed in two volumes, the first volume being on General Administration, and the second on Development Administration. If funds are available, a study of the post-Independence administrative developments may, in addition, be undertaken in a third volume, covering both general and development administration. The

preliminary draft of all chapters of the first volume is nearing completion.

(iii) *Basic Research on the Panchayati Raj—Community Development Programme*

This five-year project was started in December, 1962, to be completed in various phases, which are inter-dependent, and cover a number of States. In the first phase, which ended in 1963, the existing literature on the subject was reviewed and bibliography completed. The second phase commenced in 1964, and it was planned to take up the compilation and analysis of acts and rules relating to Panchayati Raj, preparation and testing of research tools, questionnaires, interviews, collection of data etc., in one district each of the States of U.P., Punjab, Rajasthan, Andhra Pradesh, Mysore and Madras. Pursuant to the communication received from the Ford Foundation that funds were not available for releasing further amount of the sanctioned grant, the programme had to be considerably curtailed. On the basis of information and data so far collected and analysed, a report is under preparation, which aims at giving as comprehensive a picture as possible of the result of the studies which have been completed, or are being processed, in regard to Panchayati Raj and Community Development programmes.

(iv) *Case Study Programme*

Of the four case studies planned for publication this year, the following have been completed:

- (i) "The abolition of posts of Divisional Commissioners in the old Central Provinces and Berar in 1948, and their re-creation in the new Madhya Pradesh in 1956."
- (ii) "The decision to set up pilot section as a basic work unit of the Central Secretariat."

The third case study which was on "Decision to introduce Farm Forestry" was dropped after examining the nature and scope of the subject matter of the proposed study, and on other relevant considerations.

The fourth case study on "The establishment of the Central Secretariat Services" could not be taken up until recently, when the records were made available.

It has been decided to take up eleven more case studies on various subjects, by different writers. The Committee on Case Studies is now working in close co-operation with the Department of Administrative Reforms in the Ministry of Home Affairs, for selection and writing of cases.

(v) *Depth Study of the Administration of Technical Assistance Programme in India*

It was mentioned in the last report that the question whether this project should be continued or not was under examination, and that the decision was partly dependent on the availability of a further grant from the Ford Foundation. As no further grant would be forthcoming, it has been decided to drop the project.

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Research Projects financed by the Asia Foundation

(i) *Evolution of the Constitution*

As mentioned in the last report, the scheme of the project is to bring out 5 volumes, one narrative, and four of documents.

The work of compiling, editing and annotating the four volumes of documents has been completed. Work on the narrative volume is nearing completion. Volumes I and II of the documents are already in the press. The entire work is expected to be ready for release early in 1966.

During the year, the Asia Foundation sanctioned a further grant of Rs. 30,000 for this project, raising the total grant to Rs. 92,000. The Government of India has also sanctioned a grant of Rs. 1,00,000, which supplements the assistance received from the Asia Foundation to bring out the 5 volumes.

(ii) *Guide to Sources of Modern Indian History*

This is a three-year project, which was started in 1963. During the year under report, the residuary work of survey and listing of records in Gujarat and Uttar Pradesh, which had been started in the previous year, was completed. Examination of the archival sources of the States of Rajasthan, Madhya Pradesh, Andhra Pradesh, Kerala and Mysore was undertaken, and systematic lists of contents of the repositories in those States were prepared. The collections surveyed include those of the State archival repositories, secretariat record rooms, the Boards of Revenue and High Courts. The archives of the Universities of Allahabad and Aligarh have also been listed.

The examination of the archives in Madras State and Bihar was undertaken in April, 1965, and it is being continued in Madras. During this period, the survey of the holdings of the National Archives was also resumed, and the pre-1947 records of the six major departments of the Central Government have been examined and listed.

It is expected that the entire work of listing and survey of the archival collections in the country will be completed by June, 1966, and the "Guide" itself finally edited and completed by December, 1966.

II. TEACHING

The sixth Annual Day of the Indian School of Public Administration was held on July 15, 1964. Shri Humayun

Kabir, Union Minister of Petroleum and Chemicals, delivered the convocation address and awarded the Master's Diploma in Public Administration to 24 candidates.

The seventh session (1964-65) of the Master's Diploma course in Public Administration commenced on July 15, 1964. In all, 33 candidates were admitted, but actually 32 joined the course. Among the candidates admitted were 8 University teachers (one each from the Universities of Punjab, Magadh, Gauhati, Madras, Bhagalpur and Agra, and two from the University of Marathawada), six officers deputed, by the Government of India, and six by the State Governments of Maharashtra (two officers), Bihar, Madhya Pradesh, Rajasthan, and Uttar Pradesh. After joining the course, four general students left the School, and the strength of the class at the end of the course was 28.

Out of a generous grant made available by the USAID, the School awarded eight senior scholarships to the university teachers attending the Course. The School gave six scholarships to general students of the Master's Diploma.

The School received two foreign scholars, one from the U.S.A., and the other from Japan. The scholar from U.S.A., Mr. Richard Hamilton of the Men's Graduate Centre, Duke University, Durham, North Carolina, came to India for a period of six months commencing from October, 1964 to complete his research studies for the Ph. D. Degree on "D.V.C." The Japanese scholar, Mr. Minrou Ouchi, from the Institute of Asian Economic Affairs, Tokyo, arrived in May, 1965, to make a study on "Government's Role in the Economic Development of India", for a period of two years. Both the scholars have been working under the direction of the faculty members.

In addition to the regular staff of the School, Shri J.M. Shrinagesh, I.C.S. (retd.), continued as Professor under the Ford Foundation Scheme. Dr. Edward V. Schten, Bureau

of Government, University of Wisconsin, U.S.A., joined the School as Visiting Professor from July 27 to September 1, 1964. He was primarily concerned with the development of the first phase of the Reflective Training Programme (1964-65) for District and other administrative officers deputed by the Central and State Governments. Prof. Donald C. Pelz, Programme Director, Survey Research Centre, University of Michigan, joined the School as Visiting Professor from September 10, 1964, as an Adviser in Research Methodology for a period of one year, in the first instance, under the Indo-USAID Government Operation FY-1964.

III. TRAINING

I. TRAINING COURSES FOR MUNICIPAL EXECUTIVE OFFICERS

At the request of the Ministry of Health, Government of India, the School of Public Administration conducted two

short-term training courses, each of six weeks duration, for the Executive Officers of various municipal bodies in India.

The Advisory Committee for these courses consisted of Dr. J. N. Khosla, Shri R.R. Bahl, O.S.D., Oil and Natural Gas Commission, Shri Gyan Prakash, Joint Secretary, Ministry of Health, Government of India, and Prof. N. Srinivasan (who was Professor in charge of the courses).

The courses were intended to give the participants an insight into the theoretical and practical aspects of municipal administration in India and abroad, in the fields of municipal government, municipal finance, personnel training and management, development and allied problems.

The first course was inaugurated by Dr. Sushila Nayar, Union Minister for Health, and the concluding session was addressed by Bawa Bachittar Singh, the then Mayor of Delhi. The course was attended by 16 officers.

The second course was inaugurated by Shri P.S. Naskar, Deputy Minister for Health, Government of India, and the concluding session was addressed by Shri A.P. Jain, M.P. (now Governor, Kerala). The course was attended by 21 officers.

2. TRAINING COURSES FOR OFFICERS OF THE MINISTRY OF HOME AFFAIRS

At the request of the Union Ministry of Home Affairs, two short-term training courses, each of eight weeks' duration, were conducted during the session for officers of that Ministry.

The Advisory Committee for the courses consisted of Dr. J.N. Khosla, Shri L.R. Adige, Shri O.P. Grover, and Prof. A. Avasthi, who was Professor in charge of the courses.

The courses aimed at acquainting the participants with the contemporary economic, social, political and administrative developments in India, and to develop in them an awareness of the present-day world problems.

The first course was inaugurated by Shri S.P. Verma (Ministry of Home Affairs), and the concluding session was addressed by Shri Balbir Singh (Ministry of Home Affairs). Twenty-four officers attended the course.

The second course was inaugurated by Shri M.M. Hooja (Ministry of Home Affairs), and the concluding session was addressed by Shri Balbir Singh (Ministry of Home Affairs). Twenty-six officers attended the course.

3. FIRST ORIENTATION COURSE IN DEVELOPMENT ADMINISTRATION

A six-week Orientation Course in Development Administration was organised in co-operation with the Planning Commission, the Committee on Plan Projects, and the Union Ministries of Home Affairs and Community Development and Cooperation.

The Advisory Committee for the course consisted of Shri Tarlok Singh, Dr. J.N. Khosla, Shri S. Chakravarti, Shri N.K. Mukerji, Shri T.P. Singh, Dr. S.R. Sen, Shri P.N. Chaku, Shri J.M. Kitchlu, Dr. H.K. Paranjape, Dr. Jitendra Singh, and Prof. N. Srinivasan, who was also the Director of the Training Course.

The course covered, among others, orientation concept and strategy of economic and social development, perspectives and goals of planning, machinery and process of planning, Planning programmes resources (especially material resources), budgeting for funds (financial programming), development of a performance budget, problems of communication, application of work study and operations research

in development administration, reporting and appraising of programmes, project management, problems of area development programmes, relationships between official and non-official agencies and integration of their functions, principal components of urban and city development programmes, administrative aspects and implementation of city development plans and financial aspects (fiscal programming). The tools of instruction included case studies and syndicate discussions on the more important problems of development administration.

The course was inaugurated by Shri Gulzari Lal Nanda, Union Home Minister. Twenty-six administrators holding key positions in Development, Finance and allied departments of the State and Central Governments, including three university teachers, participated in the course. Besides these, two officers from the Ministry of Finance participated in the syndicate discussions. Towards the end of the course, the results of the studies undertaken and embodied in the reports of syndicates were reviewed at a three-day Conference on Development Administration, which was inaugurated by Shri T.T. Krishnamachari, Union Minister of Finance.

4. FIRST APPRECIATION COURSE ON TECHNIQUES OF ADMINISTRATIVE IMPROVEMENT

An eight-week Appreciation Course on Techniques of Administrative Improvement was organised at the instance of and in collaboration with the Department of Administrative Reforms, Ministry of Home Affairs, Government of India.

The Advisory Committee for the course consisted of Dr. J.N. Khosla, Shri N.K. Mukerji, Shri S.K. Datta, Shri K.K. Das, Shri B.S. Mehta, Shri E.N. Mangatrai, and Prof. A. Avasthi, who was also the Director of the course.

The course was intended for officers at the level of Deputy and Under Secretaries in the Central Ministries and

officers of equivalent rank in the Secretariats and Districts in the States. The aim of the course was to facilitate a better appreciation of the practical problems and needs of administrative reforms at all levels of administration. Emphasis was laid on the orientation of the officers in the practical application and use of administrative techniques to enable them not only to undertake the organising of and programming for administrative reforms in their respective organisations, but also to execute those programmes and provide guidance to others engaged in the implementation of similar programmes.

Shri L.P. Singh, Secretary to the Government of India, Ministry of Home Affairs, inaugurated the course. Twenty-four officers of the Central and State Governments participated in the course. Apart from day-to-day lecture-discussion sessions, the participants were divided into three seminar groups for the following topics: (1) Administrative Reforms—formulation, implementation and follow-up, (2) Problems of Delegation—administrative and financial; (3) Problems of Co-ordination. In addition, the entire group of participants was divided into four teams to conduct administrative surveys of specified agencies on the following topics:

- (i) Administrative survey of the Capital Goods Division of the Office of the Chief Controller of Imports and Exports, New Delhi.
- (ii) Administrative survey of the working of Ashoka Hotel.
- (iii) Survey of the working of Janpath Hotel (with special reference to clientele satisfaction).
- (iv) Administrative survey of the Delhi Milk Scheme.

To orient the officers in the practical application and use of administrative techniques in the field of project

planning and control and techniques of management, a study of the Steel Project at Bhilai was included as a part of the training programme of the course.

Each participant was attached for two days to the Staff Inspection Unit of the Union Ministry of Finance, the Department of Administrative Reforms, and the Planning Commission.

This course was the first in the series of several such courses to be organised every year.

5. SECOND REFLECTIVE TRAINING PROGRAMME

With financial assistance from the Ford Foundation, the second eight-months' Reflective Training Course in India and abroad was conducted for 17 district and other administrative officers deputed by the Central and State Governments.

The course was organised with the advice and assistance of a committee consisting of Dr. J.N. Khosla, Shri V.S. Hejmadi, Shri S.K. Dutta, Shri S.N. Majumdar, Prof. S.V. Kogekar, and Shri K.B. Rao.

The course aimed at improving the professional competence and widening of the intellectual horizons of administrators through an intensive programme of study at the School, and study-cum-observation tours abroad. As last year, the programme consisted of three phases. The first phase (about 2 months) covered the study of public administration, with special reference to development administration, and familiarisation with administrative institutions abroad. The second phase (about 3 months) covered visits to four foreign countries, *viz.*, Yugoslavia, Britain, U.S.A. and Japan, involving field visits to study local as well as agricultural, industrial and other facets of development administration. Also included in the programme was a

three-week integrated course on development administration at the University of Wisconsin, U.S.A. During the last phase of the programme (about $1\frac{1}{2}$ months), the participants prepared individual papers on the subjects selected by them.

Instruction for the course included lectures, seminars and discussions on aspects of development administration, viz., public policy formulation in relation to economic development at the national and state levels, the machinery and techniques of implementation at the state, district and field levels; financial aspects: the exploitation of local resources, ensuring economy and efficiency and propriety; citizen participation in development work; development administration, especially in the field of agriculture, small industries, community development, education and health, co-operative movement, local government, panchayati raj and public co-operation, in the countries visited.

Prof. V.S. Hejmadi was in charge of the first phase of the training programme, and Shri B.S. Mehta, Chief Secretary, Government of Rajasthan, of the second phase, when the group went abroad. Dr. J.N. Khosla took charge during the third phase, when the group returned to India.

6. TRAINING COURSE IN SURVEY RESEARCH METHODOLOGY

With financial assistance and co-operation of USAID, an eight-week training course on "Survey Research Methodology" was organised. Twenty-two representatives from various universities, State governments and a few members of the Institute's research staff attended the course.

The Advisory Committee for the course consisted of Dr. J.N. Khosla, Shri Tarlok Singh, Dr. H.K. Hyde (USAID), Dr. R.J. Chelliah, Prof. R.S. Dass, Prof. B.S. Khanna, Shri Anand Sarup, Shri K.L. Baraya, Dr. S. Srivastava, Dr. R.D. Singh, Dr. A.P. Barnabas, Prof. V. Jagannadham, Shri H.F.B. Pais, and Dr. D.C. Pelz (who was Director of the course).

On the principle of learning by doing, the participants conducted a pilot survey on "Coordination, Initiative and Communication in Administration of Agricultural Development", in which they interviewed officials and non-officials at district and block levels in Alwar, Mathura and Ludhiana Districts.

In the second phase, the participants will constitute survey units at the Punjab, Rajasthan, and Lucknow Universities to carry out similar but broader survey in the respective States. In subsequent phases, it is proposed to extend the training programme to some other States, with the object of establishing survey units to cover the entire country.

7. TRAINING PROGRAMME FOR THAI GOVERNMENT OFFICIALS

At the instance of the Union Ministry of Finance, and the USAID, New Delhi, a one-week training programme was organized for a group of five government officials from Thailand under the "Third Country Programme". The training programme was intended to enable the officials to study the functions and operation of O & M, Budgeting and Accounting organisations of the Government of India.

Dr. A. Avasthi was in charge of the programme.

IV. SEMINARS AND CONFERENCES

1. SEMINARS ON "PROBLEMS AND TECHNIQUES OF BUDGETING"

With the assistance of Mr. Carl W. Tiller, Chief, Budget Methods, U.S. Bureau of Budget, whose services were secured for the Institute by USAID, the following seminars were conducted on Problems and Techniques of Budgeting:

The seminars were attended by about 100 persons. They included financial advisers and controllers of public enterprises, audit and accounts officers dealing with the audit of Government companies, senior officers of the Union Ministry of Finance, and of some private industrial undertakings, and professional auditors and accountants. Dr. M.J.K. Thavaraj was in charge of the seminars.

2. CONFERENCE ON "ORGANISATION AND INFORMATION FOR TOP MANAGEMENT CONTROL"

A conference on "Organisation and Information for Top Management Control" was organised by the Institute in collaboration with the United States Agency for International Development. The purpose of the conference was to review the latest research experiments, innovations and demonstrations of the application of scientific approaches to improving decision-making and facilitating the implementation of programmes in enterprises, public, and private. The conference was attended by selected top level managers and administrators. Discussions were initiated by experts from the United States and India.

3. CONFERENCE ON "ADMINISTRATIVE REFORMS"

The Conference on "Administrative Reforms", which was initially convened in August, 1963, met again on October 22-23, 1964 under the chairmanship of Dr. C.D. Deshmukh. It considered the reports of the three Advisory Groups set up in 1963, one each on reforms in the spheres of general administration, industrial administration, and agricultural administration. About two dozen research and background papers prepared under the guidance of the advisory groups were circulated to the participants, who numbered over 30. After its plenary session, the conference divided itself into three working groups. The first working group on administrative reforms in general administration, which was presided over by Shri N.V. Gadgil, examined

various questions pertaining to the creation of requisite social climate, relations between the Secretariat and executive agencies, incentives in public services, increased delegation of power, and citizen-administration relations. The second group on industrial administration, which was presided over by Shri D.L. Mazumdar, examined problems of managerial cadres for public enterprises, consultative machinery within the government in relation to the private sector, and the need for constituting an evaluation-cum-consulting unit in Government. The third group on agricultural administration was presided over by Shri R.A. Gopalaswamy, and it considered problems of agricultural administration at the block and village levels, including the problems of planning, supplies, the role of cooperatives, research and extension, and the panchayats and agricultural production. The reports of the workig groups were discussed at the plenary session of the conference. These reports and the proceedings of the conference are being prepared for publication.

4. CONFERENCE ON "ADMINISTRATIVE REFORMS SINCE INDEPENDENCE"

The Eighth Annual Conference of the Members of the Institute was held on October 24, 1964, under the Chairmanship of Shri N.V. Gadgil. The subject of discussion was "Administrative Reforms Since Independence".

5. SEMINAR ON "VITALITY IN PUBLIC ADMINISTRATION"

In collaboration with Delhi Productivity Council, a seminar was held on "Vitality in Public Administration" to discuss various aspects of vitality in general administration, and measures for toning up administration to meet new challenges and demands. The discussion was particularly directed towards the following issues: (1) administration in developing countries; (2) leadership in administration; (3) a new look at bureaucracy; (4) motivation and incentives;

and (5) productivity in administration—performance, appraisal and analysis. The participants included senior administrative officers from the Central Government, Uttar Pradesh, Rajasthan, Delhi Administration and the Delhi Municipal Corporation.

VI. PUBLICATIONS

A Special Issue (July-September, 1964, Vol. X. No. 3) of the Journal on “Organisation and Management of Public

Enterprises" was brought out on the occasion of the Annual Meeting of the General Body of the Institute held in 1964.

3. PERSPECTIVES: STUDIES IN POLITICAL AND SOCIAL FORECASTING (Biennial Supplement to the Journal)

Under the auspices of the Indian Council for the Future, set up by the Institute in 1963, the Institute has brought out the first issue of the biennial supplement to its Journal, entitled "Perspectives: Studies in Political and Social Forecasting". The issue contains the following three studies: (1) "The Future of the Backward Classes: The Competing Demands of Status and Power" by *Mr. Andre Beteille*; (2) "Trade Unions in India: A Preview of 1975" by *Shri V.B. Karnik*; and (3) "The Press in India: Today and Tomorrow" by *Shri Chanchal Sarkar*.

VII. LIBRARY AND REFERENCE SERVICES

During the year, the Library of the Institute acquired 5090 volumes, bringing the total number on March 31, 1965, to 70055 volumes of books, public documents, periodicals and newspapers.

The number of periodicals received at the close of the year stood at 500, an addition of 12 new titles during the year. The Gazette of India and the Gazettes of all the States continued to be received. Fourteen Indian and five foreign newspapers were also received during the year.

Depository collection, placed in the Library by the Economic Development Institute of the International Bank for Reconstruction and Development, Washington, D.C., on economic development in the developing countries, had 442 volumes at the beginning of the year. No volume was received for the collection during the year.

Library facilities were availed of by 697 persons (members 301, school students 43, Institute and School Staff 133, and other individuals on special permit 320). The number of volumes loaned out was 11432, an increase of 3285 over the previous year. Inter-Library loans during the year involved 59 libraries and Government Departments, against 48 during the previous year. The number of volumes loaned out was 366, and the number borrowed from other

libraries was 43, against the previous year's figures of 228 and 50 respectively. The reserved collection continued to be heavily drawn upon for reference and study by the participants of the courses in the School.

Twelve bibliographies were prepared on request. The number of external enquiries dealt with was 210.

Two separate card indices of Public Administration news, indexed from the newspapers received, and of articles indexed and included in the Public Administration Abstracts and Index of Articles during the year, have been maintained.

Monthly list of additions to the Library continued to be prepared in the Library.

VIII. OTHER ACTIVITIES

A. FOREIGN CONTACTS

(i) *EROPA Meetings*

The Director represented the Institute at the Regional Seminar on Metropolitan Planning in Asia, organized from June 7 to 13, 1964, at Tokyo, under the joint auspices of the Tokyo Metropolitan Government, Eastern Regional Organization for Public Administration (EROPA), the International Union of Local Authorities (IULA), and the Japan Society for Urban Studies. The Director also attended the meeting of the working Party Seminar on "Organising for Development" held from May 31 to June 6, 1964, to discuss the questionnaire on Financing Development, prepared and presented by Prof. M.V. Mathur, Head of the Department of Economics and Public Administration, University of Rajasthan, Jaipur (and a member of the Institute's Executive Council), in his capacity as Consultant to EROPA.

(ii) *IIAS Warsaw Round Table 1964*

As provided by the triennial programme adopted by the IIAS Council of Administration at the Vienna Congress in

1962, a Round Table was organized at Warsaw from June 23 to 27, 1964, to discuss the following subjects: (1) Public Relations: The influence of the Public on the Operation of Public Administration, excluding Electoral Rights; (2) New Techniques of Budget Preparation and Management; and (3) Administrative Management of Public Enterprises.

Detailed replies to the questionnaires on each of the three subjects were furnished by the Institute. The Director attended the Round Table, as also the meeting of Directors and Principals of Schools and Institutes of Public Administration. Papers on "Improving of Academic and Non-Academic Curricula for Education and Training in Development Administration" and "Administrative Impediments to Development" were presented by the Director to the latter meeting. Delegates numbering about 250 from 40 member countries, including U.S.S.R. and Eastern European countries, participated in the Round Table.

(iii) The Third General Assembly of EROPA

The Director represented the Institute at the Third General Assembly of EROPA which met in Seoul, Republic of Korea, from 7th to 17th November, 1964. The agenda for the Assembly was : (1) Planning and Policies for Development, (2) Administrative Machinery for Development, and (3) Financing Development.

Prof. M.V. Mathur, Head of the Department of Economics and Public Administration, University of Rajasthan, and now a member of the Education Commission, participated as an EROPA Consultant on "Financing Development". He also acted as the chairman of the Assembly's Working Group on this subject. On an invitational travel grant from the USAID, India, Dr. Ajit M. Banerjee, an officer of the Institute also attended the Assembly, as a consultant in connection with the preparation of the final EROPA report on Personnel Management and Administration.

The Director also attended the Seventh and Eighth meetings of the Executive Council of EROPA, which preceded and succeeded respectively the Third General Assembly. He was elected a member of the New Executive Council.

(iv) EROPA Conference on Technical Assistance

Dr. Jitendra Singh, Reader in Public Administration, ISPA, and Secretary, Committee on Case Studies, acted as a consultant to the EROPA Conference on Technical Assistance held in Bangkok from January 18 to 23, 1965.

B. IIPA ESSAY COMPETITION

Eight essays were received for the IIPA Essay Competition, 1964. One was rejected, as it was not in proper form, and not in accordance with the prescribed conditions; and another was not considered, as it was received long after the prescribed date. The Committee of Judges were unanimously of the opinion that none of the essays evaluated came to the minimum standard for the award of even a second prize (Rs. 500). Accordingly, no prize was awarded.

The following subjects have been selected for IIPA Essay Competition for 1965:

- (i) Administrative Reforms to check Tax Evasion.
- (ii) Relations between State Governments and Municipal Bodies.
- (iii) Coordination of Development Programmes at the District and/or Block level.

3. FINANCE AND ACCOUNTS

FORD FOUNDATION GRANT

The Second instalment of \$97,500 was received out of the Supplementary grant of \$700,000 sanctioned by the Ford

Foundation to support the first two years of the Institute's five-year programme of training and research. As mentioned earlier in this report, the major portion of the grant which was not drawn has lapsed, and the projects started with the support of the Supplementary grant are, in the circumstances, being brought to as useful a conclusion as possible, out of the balance with the Institute, from the funds already released by the Ford Foundation. A brief account of various programmes and projects undertaken with the assistance of the Ford Foundation Supplementary grant has been given separately in this report.

GRANT BY THE ASIA FOUNDATION

A Supplementary grant of Rs. 30,000 was made available to the Institute by the Asia Foundation for the study of the "Evolution of the Constitution of India". The total grant sanctioned by the Asia Foundation for this project is Rs. 92,000.

As mentioned in the last year's report, the Asia Foundation sanctioned a grant of Rs. 1,43,100 to support the second project entitled "Guide to Sources of Modern History—1700-1947". The grant is payable over a period of three years (1963-66), out of which two instalments aggregating Rs. 87,700 have been received.

The progress made on the two projects mentioned above has been indicated separately in this report.

ACCOUNTS FOR 1964-65

The total payments on account of all the activities of the Institute during the year under review, including the programmes and projects undertaken with the assistance of grants received from the Ford Foundation and the Asia Foundation, were Rs.18,18,438, excluding the closing cash and bank balances, and payments made on account of the

construction of building for the Institute of Applied Manpower Research.

The Institute received from the Government of India, as in the previous year, a grant of Rs. 9,00,000 for meeting recurring expenditure. The Statement of Income and Expenditure and Balance Sheet with Schedules are given in Appendices VIII and IX.

Messrs S. Vaidyanath Aiyer & Co. continued to work as Honorary Auditors for the Institute during the year under report.

BUDGET ESTIMATES FOR 1965-66

The Budget Estimates for 1965-66 are given in Appendix X.

Excluding expenditure to be met on specific programmes and projects out of grants sanctioned for the purpose by the Ford Foundation and the Asia Foundation, the budget provides for total payments of Rs. 13,74,500. The receipts estimated from the Institute's own resources are Rs. 3,04,500 and the Government of India was requested to raise the annual grant-in-aid from Rs. 9,00,000 to Rs. 10,70,000 to cover the deficit, but it regretted its inability to do so. The

Government of India has been again requested to reconsider its decision, and there is every hope that the request of the Institute will be accepted.

4. REGIONAL BRANCHES

The number of Regional and Local Branches of the Institute continued to be nine and seven respectively. Steps are being taken to open more Regional and Local Branches.

5. CONCLUSION

During the year under review, there has been perceptible progress and consolidation of the efforts of the Institute to widen the scope of its training and research programmes. The Institute has now embarked on a programme of research studies which are operational, and more pragmatic in nature.

Surveys are being undertaken to assist the Administration to get an idea of the image which the public has of the functioning of the administrative machinery. Such studies should improve public understanding on the one hand, and enable the authorities to assess the impact of their policies and programmes on the citizen, on the other.

The first such survey which was undertaken during the year, at the suggestion of the Home Minister, was in regard

to the experience of citizens in getting water connection in Delhi. The report of this survey has very recently been published. The Institute has been asked to undertake similar surveys in three other fields, namely, experience of the citizen or the public in their dealings with the Customs authorities; booking of goods by railways; and building construction in Delhi.

As mentioned earlier in this report, at the instance of the Government of Punjab, the Institute has undertaken certain studies for the Punjab Administrative Reforms Commission.

The training programme of the Institute also made considerable headway, and nine training courses were successfully organised, in addition to the Master's Diploma course in Public Administration. Of particular significance were the Orientation Course in Development Administration, which was conducted in close collaboration with the Planning Commission, and the Appreciation Course on Techniques of Administrative Improvement, conducted at the instance and in association with the Ministry of Home Affairs. The Institute has been requested to organise more such courses. Informal discussions are in progress in regard to a proposal from another Ministry to conduct a special course of training for senior officers.

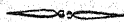
The Institute is greatly encouraged by the interest and appreciation shown by the Government of India, and State Governments in the activities and programmes of the Institute. The Institute will consider it a privilege to undertake surveys, or special courses, which the Government of India or the State Governments may suggest, but the limiting factor is finance. Even so, the Institute is doing its best to carry out these special programmes within the resources available, and it has confidence that on the result of the useful work done by the Institute, more funds will be made available by the Government.

The library and reference services are being progressively expanded, and increasing number of persons and institutions are making use of the facilities provided. The library of the Institute is considered to be one of the best on the subject in Asia.

There has been substantial increase in the number of publications brought out during the year, for which there is a growing demand.

In spite of the sustained progress and consolidation of its various activities, the Institute has not overlooked the desirability or need for evaluating its work. In accordance with the recommendations made in the Five Year Plan Committee appointed by the Executive Council some time back, and whose report was published in 1963, an Evaluation Committee has recently been appointed to review and evaluate the work of the Institute in the context of the objectives for which the Institute was established, and to suggest ways and means for improvement or revision of the pattern of its activities.

The Institute is deeply indebted to the Government of India, the Ford Foundation, USAID, and Asia Foundation for their generous financial support. The Government grant has been of great help in operating the Institute's regular programme of research, training, and library development. The Institute is also grateful to the Central Government and the State Governments for allowing their civil servants to participate in the Institute's training and other activities.

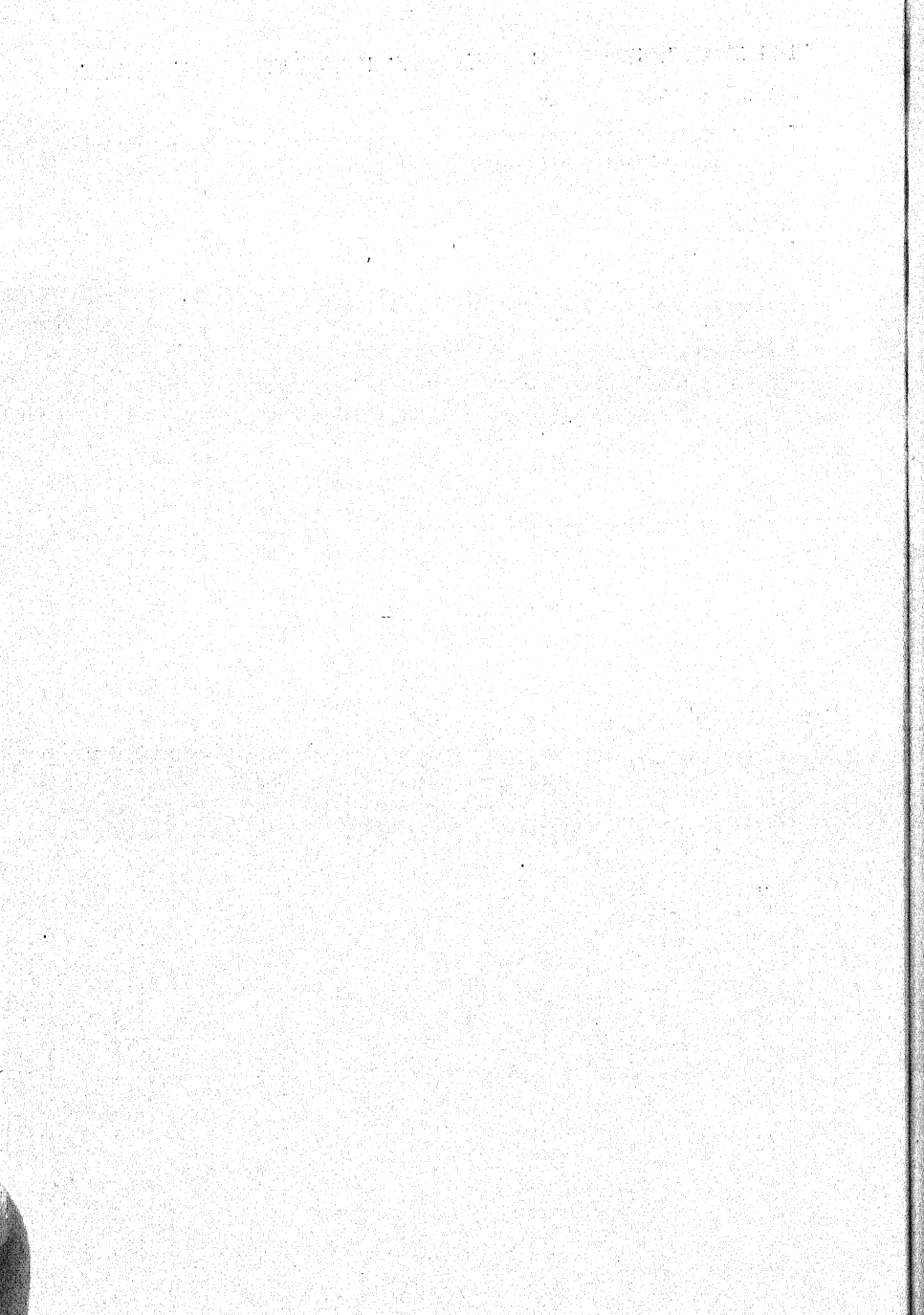
