INTRODUCTION -THE INDIAN DIASPORA: DYNAMICS OF MIGRATION



To study a banyan tree, you not only must know its main stem in its own soil, but also must trace the growth of its greatness in the further soil, for then you can know the true nature of its vitality. The civilization of India, like the banyan tree, has shed its beneficent shade away from its own birth place..... India can live and grow by spreading abroad - not the political India, but the ideal India.

The banyan tree has thrust down roots in soil which is stony, sandy, marshy- and has somehow drawn sustenance from diverse unpromising conditions. Yet the banyan tree itself has changed; its similarity to the original growth is still there, but it has changed in response to its different environment.

Three events that has further generated interest among the scholars in the study of Dynamics of Indian Diaspora:

- *Pravasi Bharatiya Diwas*(Non-Resident Indian Day) is celebrated in India on 9th January each year since 2003 to mark the contribution of the Overseas Indian community to the development of India.
- On this day in 1915 that **Mahatma Gandhi**, the greatest Pravasi, returned to India from South Africa & led India's freedom struggle.
- **Prime Minister Narendra Modi's** visit to abroad and addressing the Indian Diasporic Communities
- Indian Council for Cultural Relations (ICCR) in collaboration with Antar Rashtriya Sahayog Parishad-Bharat, conducting the International Conference in 2016 to explore 'Indian origins' of **Roma** people in Europe.

DEFINING DIASPORA

-Origin Greek, from 'diaspeirein' meaning 'disperse", from dia 'across'+ speirein 'disperse".

Thus, the term 'diaspora' means the dispersion or spread of any people from their original homeland (Ox. En. Dict).

- The diaspora of boat people from Asia

INDIAN DIASPORA

- •Modern Indian diaspora consists of non-resident Indians(NRIs) and persons of Indian origin(PIOs), as per GOI categories.
- •NRIs comprise Indian citizens who have migrated to another country
- •Persons of Indian origin born outside India or residing outside India.
- •A PIO is usually a person who is not a citizen of India.
- •Anyone of Indian origin up to four generations removed is a PIO.



•SIZE OF MODERN INDIAN DIASPORA


- •The population of the modern Indian Diaspora is estimated to be about 31 million.
- •Six major geographical zones of Indian diaspora are: Africa and Mauritius, West and Southeast Asia, the Pacific, the Caribbean, North America and Europe.

MIGRATION STREAMS

- **1.First Migration-The Plantation Diaspora**(Mauritius, South Africa, Malaya, Singapore, Srilanka, Anglophone, Francophone & Dutch Colonies in the Caribbean) **In the Pacific**, migration to Fijji started in 1870s, Mid-twentieth century labour migration to the Gulf countries.
- **2. Second Migration**-The migration of mostly free skilled Indians to various parts of the world including Europe, Canada, Australia, and the Americas beginning from the 1950s & 1960s.
- **3. Third Migration**-The movement and advancement of second, third and fourth generations of diasporic people to other locations.
